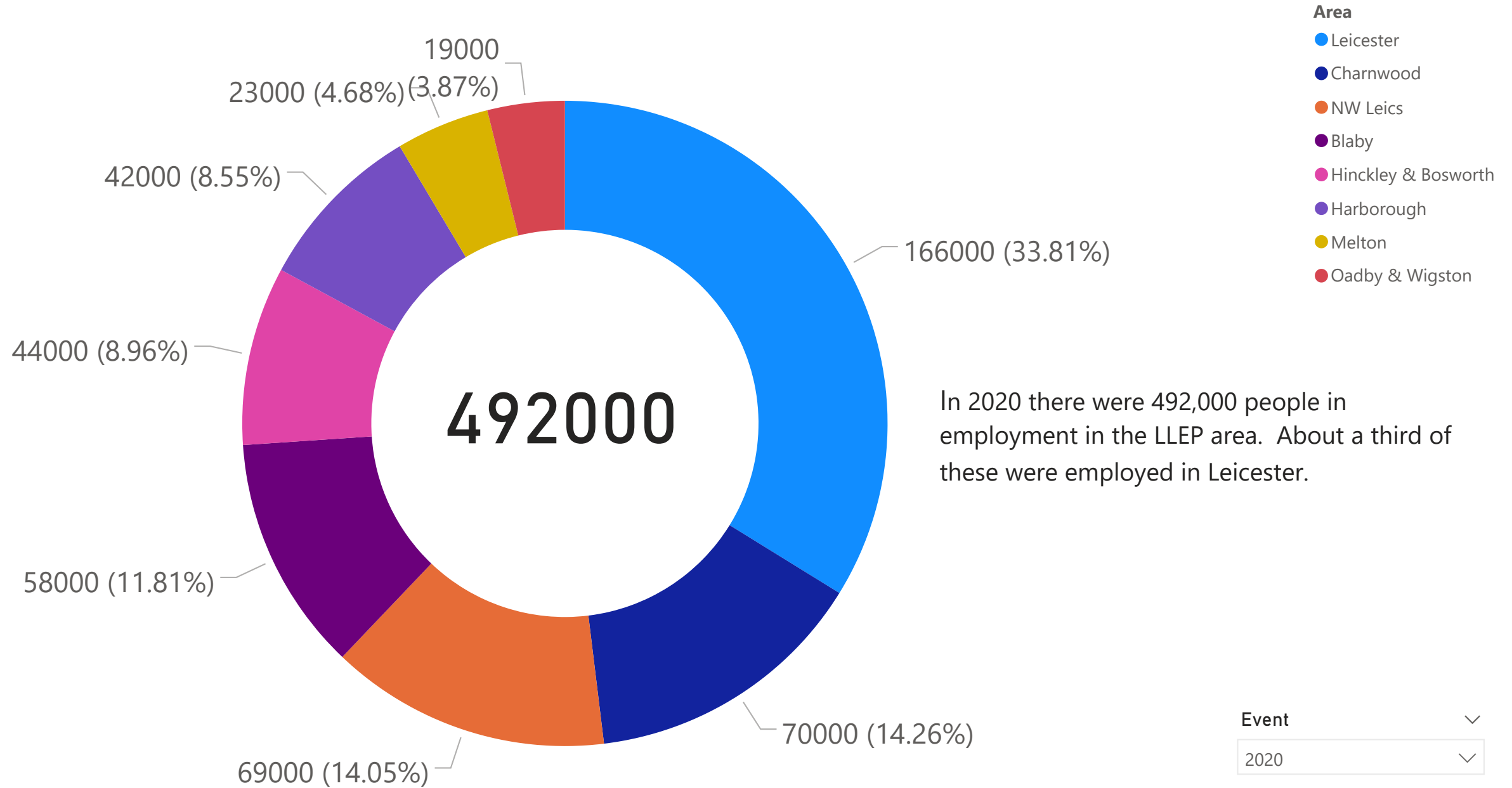
Initial Breakdown - LLEP Area

The Business Register and Employment Survey (BRES) provides employee and employment estimates at detailed geographical and industrial levels and is regarded as the definitive source of official government employee statistics by industry. The latest data released in November 2021 relates to 2020 and provides an insight into the impact of the Covid 19 pandemic on industry and related employment. Data is at a 2 digit level (Standard Industrial Code).

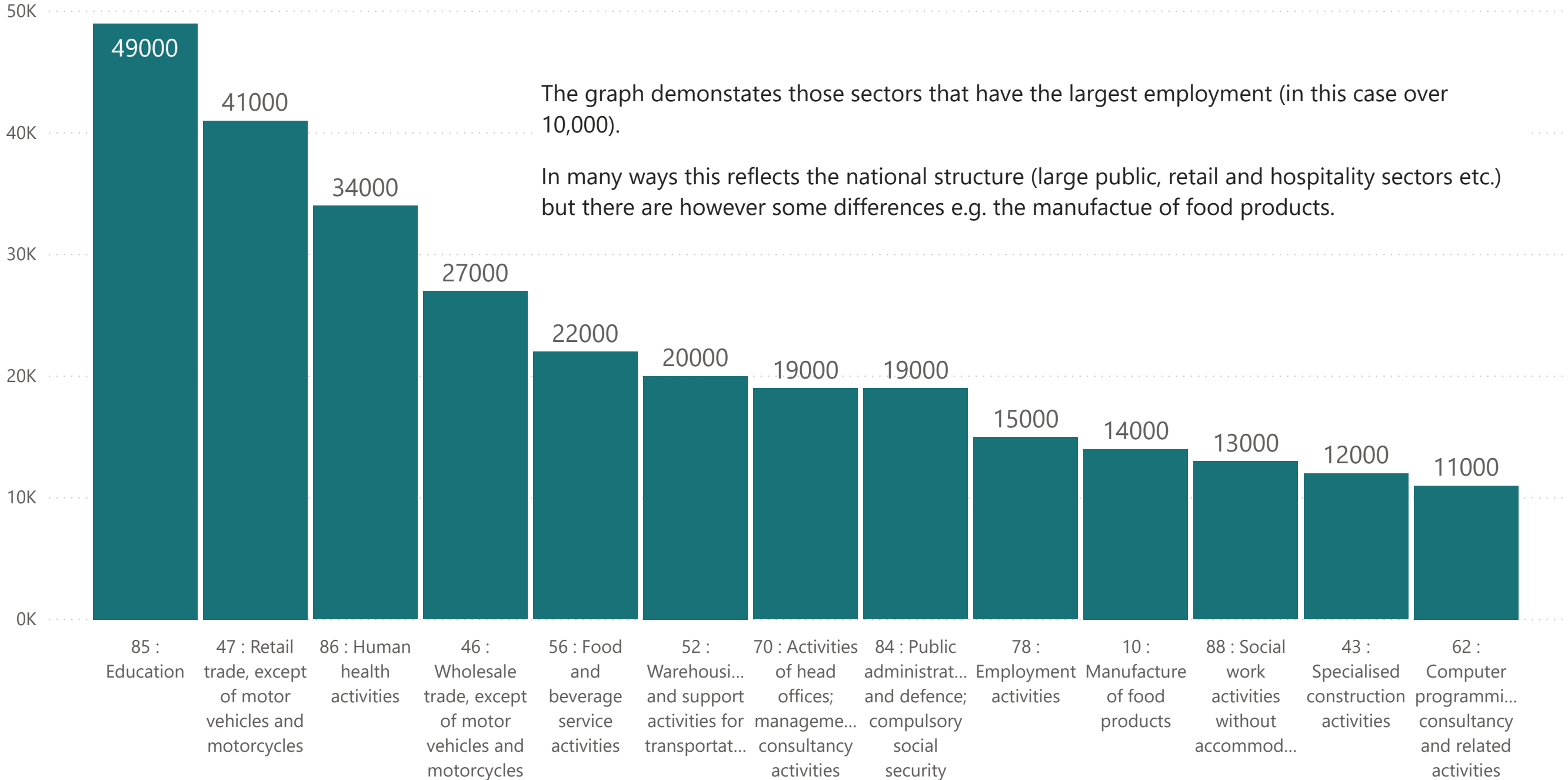

What differentiates the LLEP Area when comparing it to others?



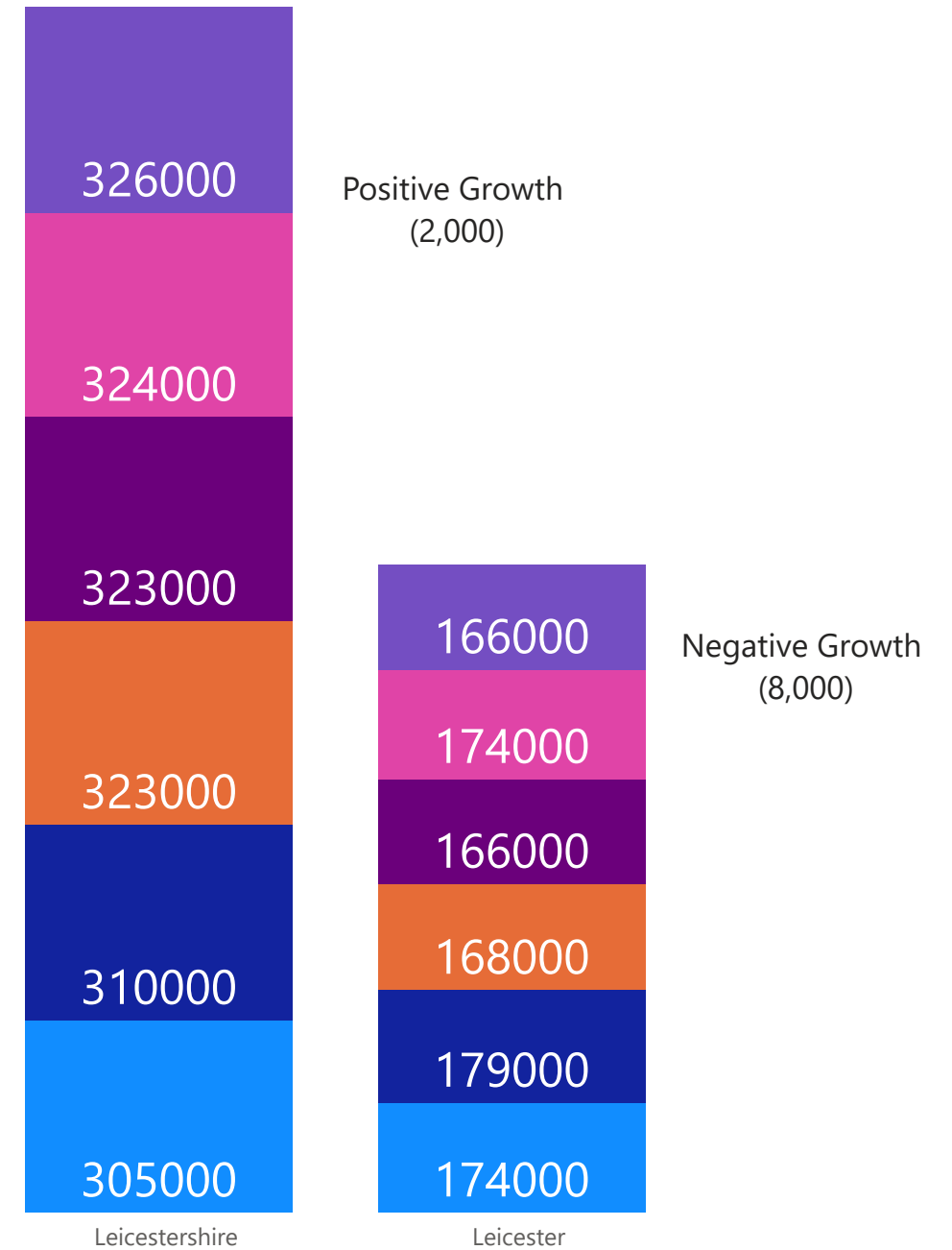
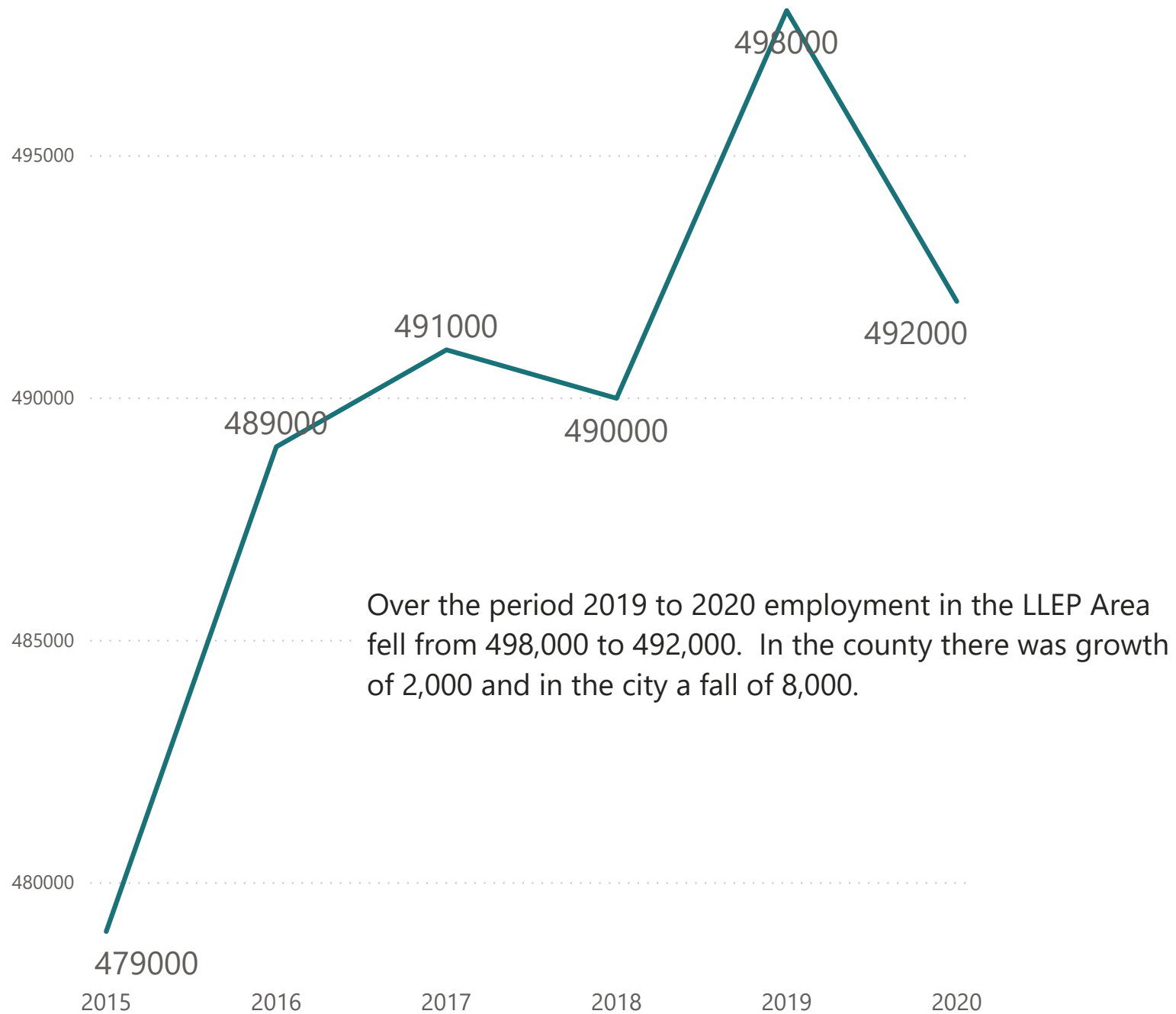
Using location quotients (LQ) based on each sectors employment share, the graph demonstrates what parts of the local industrial structure differentiate it from others. Those sectors with a LQ greater than 1 are shown.

Ten of 13 sectors are manufacturing with the top 2 relating to textiles/ clothing manufacturing.

Only manufacture of food products and warehousing and support activities for transportation were identified as some of the largest (Page 4). Manufacturing employment although higher than average only accounts for 12% of employment locally compared to 8% (England).

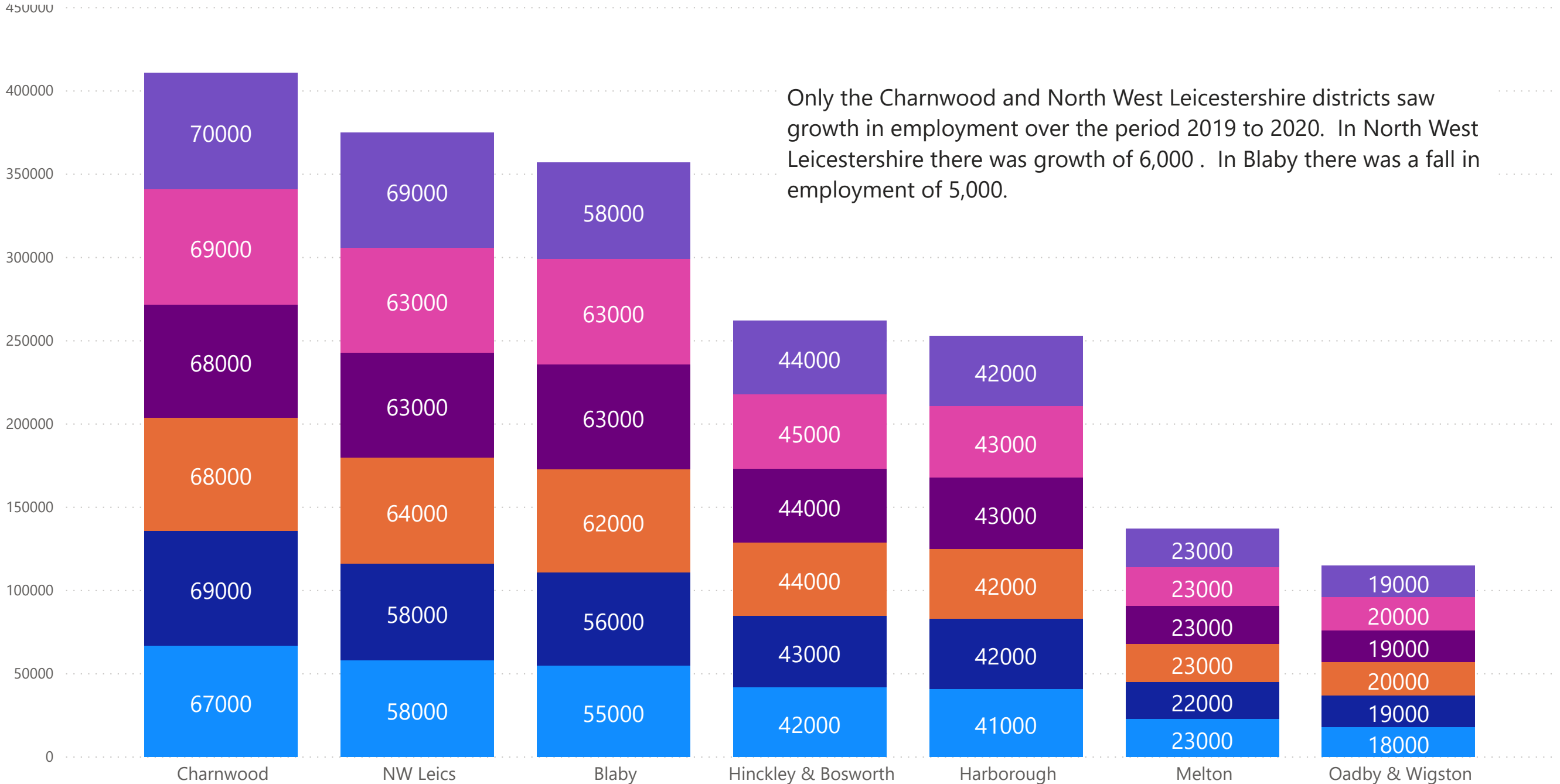
Employment Growth

● 2015 ● 2016 ● 2017 ● 2018 ● 2019 ● 2020



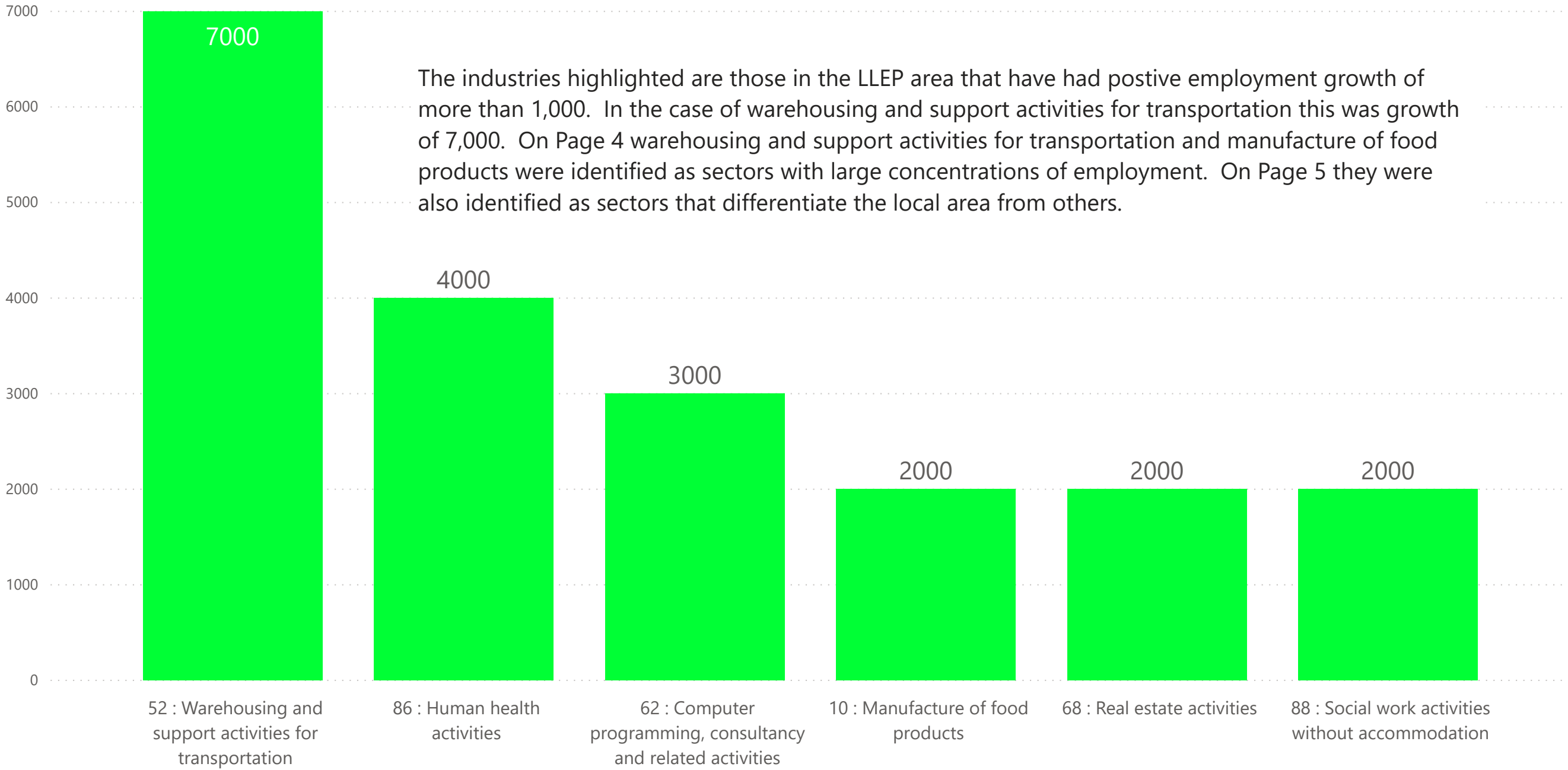
Employment Growth Districts

● 2015 ● 2016 ● 2017 ● 2018 ● 2019 ● 2020

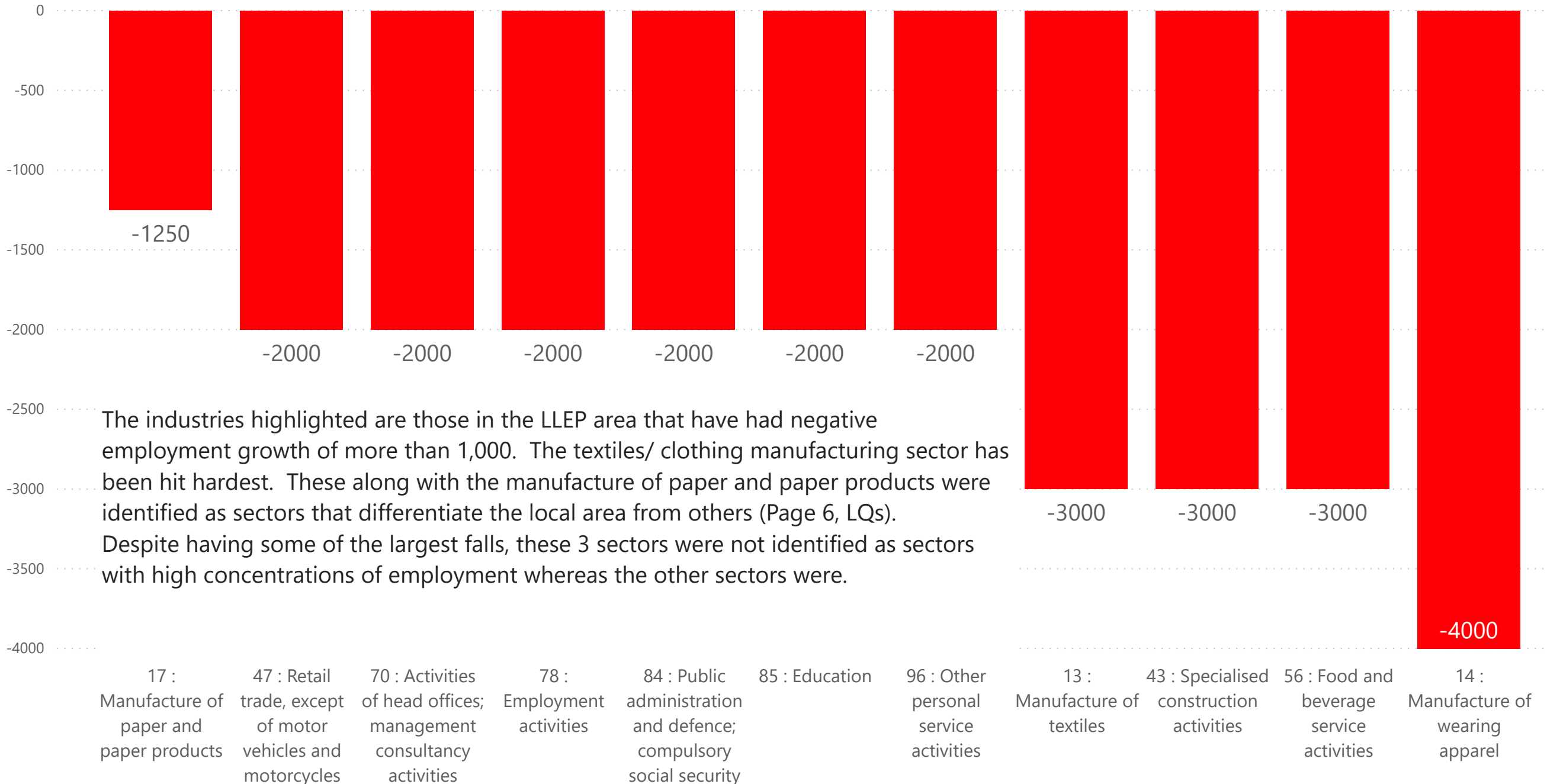


Positive Employment Growth (2019 - 2020)

The industries highlighted are those in the LLEP area that have had positive employment growth of more than 1,000. In the case of warehousing and support activities for transportation this was growth of 7,000. On Page 4 warehousing and support activities for transportation and manufacture of food products were identified as sectors with large concentrations of employment. On Page 5 they were also identified as sectors that differentiate the local area from others.
