1. Economic Roundup

A summary of some key announcements since the last update together with a round-up of recently published research and insights from a range of organisations.

2. Claimant Count

In February 2023 the claimant rate in the Leicester and Leicestershire area was 3.2%. This translates to 21,605 claimants. In January the figure was 3.1% (20,900). At a national level the claimant rate in England was 3.7%. This is 0.5 of a percentage point higher than the local figure.

The claimant rate had been slowly falling but from September to November 2022 the rate remained at 3%. The figures for December and January were 3.1% and the latest figure demonstrates another rise (3.2%).

The picture is very different in the city and county with Leicester having a claimant rate of 4.8% and Leicestershire 2.2%. This is a difference of 2.6 percentage points. Leicester's claimant rate is 1.1 percentage points higher than the England average (3.7%) and Leicestershire's 1.5 percentage points lower.




Figure 1: LLEP Area Claimant Rate (%) February 2022 – February 2023




Figure 2: LLEP Area Claimant Rate (%) February 2020 - February 2023 Source: ONS

Figure 2 below provides an annual comparator for the Leicester and Leicestershire area and compares this with regional and national figures.

Of the 21,605 claimants over half (54.9% or 11,870) were based in Leicester and 9,735 or 45.1% in Leicestershire.

In March 2020 the claimant rate was 2.3% (or 15,145). Between March 2020 and the end of February 2023 the claimant rate increased by 0.9 of a percentage point to 3.2% (21,605). This translates to an additional 6,460 claimants or a percentage increase of 42.7%.




Figure 3: LLEP Area Claimant Count February 2022 – February 2023 Source: ONS

In the Leicester and Leicestershire area over the period March to August 2020 the number of claimants grew from 15,145 to 36,025 (it's peak locally). This was a rise of 20,880 claimants or 138%. When comparing the figures for August 2020 and February 2023 against those for March 2020 the difference has fallen from 20,880 to 6,460. Since February 2022 the number of claimants has fallen by 2,465 (from 24,070).

Figure 11 later in the report, demonstrates the claimant rate over the period January 2020 to February 2023 and the number of unique job postings (for the same period).




Figure 4: LLEP Area Claimant Forecast Average to February 2024 Source Data: ONS




Figure 5: LLEP Area Claimant Rate Forecast, 3, 5, 8 and Forecast Average, February 2024 Source Data: ONS

Figures 4 and 5 below project claimant numbers forward to the end of February 2024. Projections are based on the last 3, 5 and 8 months and an average of these. This helps to identify the direction of travel in relation to claimant numbers. The average figure for February 2024 is 24,698 or 3.6%. This is above the pre-pandemic level of 2.3%. Figures continue to demonstrate an upward trend in claimant numbers.

Note: Forecasts are linear, claimant numbers however are governed by a variety of events both foreseen and unforeseen, as such forecast data should be treated with caution.

In relation to age figures for February 2023, these demonstrate that there were on average a larger share of 25-49 years olds (3.6%) who were claimants than 18-24 years olds (3.5%) and claimants that were 50 and over (2.5%). National claimant rates were higher than local figures for 18-24 years olds (4.8%), 25-49 years olds (4.2%) and those who are 50 and over (2.8%).




Figure 6: LLEP Area Claimant Rate by Age (%) February 2022 – February 2023 Source: ONS




Figure 7: LLEP Area Claimant Rate by Claimants Aged 18-24 (%) February 2022 – February 2023 Source: ONS

Twelve thousand one hundred and ninety-five (56.4%) claimants were male and 9,410 (43.6%) were female.




Figure 8: LLEP Area Claimant Rate by Gender (%) February 2022 – February 2023 Source: ONS




Figure 9: LLEP Area Claimant Count February 2015 – February 2023 Source: ONS

3. Universal Credit Claimants

Universal Credit claimants are placed in a conditionality group based on their circumstances and work capability. This determines what is expected of them during their claim.

Over the last month (January to February) the numbers searching, planning, or preparing for work has grown from 26,021 to 26,728. The numbers who are working has grown from 35,404 to 35,857.

From February 2022 those searching, planning, or preparing for work has fallen by 1,904 (from 28,632). Over the same period those with no work requirements grew by 6,752 (20,924 to 27,676).

Since March 2020 there has been a steady but significant rise in the number of people who are not seeking work/ have no work requirements with numbers more than doubling during the period. In March 2020, the figure was 10,997 and in February 2023 it was 27,676 (a rise of 16,679). Over the last year those not seeking work/ have no work requirements has grown by 5.6 percentage points.

This is the fifth consecutive month that the number of those searching, planning or preparing for work is lower than the numbers with no work requirements.




Figure 10: LLEP Area Universal Credit Claimant Count by Conditionality Group March 2020 – February 2023 Source: DWP via Stat-Xplore

4. Relationships

The figure below demonstrates the relationship between the claimant count and unique job postings. Data is for the period January 2020 onwards in the Leicester and Leicestershire area.

In February there was a fall in the number of unique job postings (35,853 to 32,448). The claimant rate over the same period in the Leicester and Leicestershire area has climbed to 3.2%. The number of claimants grew from 20,900 to 21,605.




Figure 11: Monthly Claimant Count, Unique Job Postings and Total Number of Eligible Staff Furloughed January 2020 Onwards Source: ONS Claimant Count, Lightcast Unique Job Postings and HMRC Job Retention Scheme

5. Job Postings

Unique job posting data is drawn from a range of sources and provides timely data on how the trend in the number of live job adverts is changing in the Leicester and Leicestershire area by occupation.

However, the number of job adverts being posted is not a direct measure of labour force demand. Job adverts may not be removed from online job vacancy boards immediately once a position is filled, so the data may not fully reflect companies who have halted active recruitment.

The data is compiled from multiple job vacancy boards and adverts may still be considered "live" if the posting is still on any board, even when it has already been removed from an alternative source (Lightcast remove job postings from their Analyst platform after 61 days).

The scope of online job adverts does not fully capture the region's economic activity because of differing advertising methods, for example, casual work may be advertised by word-of-mouth.

Table 1 demonstrates unique job postings by occupation for February 2023. These are compared with March 2020, February 2022 and January 2023. Standard Occupation Codes are at a two-digit level.

The number of unique job postings for February 2023 is higher than February 2022 by 4,837 (27,611 compared to 32,448). This is a rise of 17.5%.

Over the last month the number of job postings fell from 35,853 to 32,448. This is a fall of 3,405 or 9.5%.

In terms of numbers, over the last year there has been growth in job postings in all the occupation areas.

In the last month there has been negative growth in job postings in all but 3 of the occupation areas.

As a means of further understanding how the local jobs market is changing, Table 2 demonstrates the year-to-date unique job postings figures for 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023 and compares these.

Across the job market the number of unique job postings (YTD) has increased from 23,585 in 2019 to 48,471 in 2023. This is growth of 24,886 or 105.5%. All occupations areas have seen growth except transport and mobile machine drivers and operators.




Figure 12: LLEP Area Unique Job Postings March 2020 to February 2023




Figure 13: Leicester and Leicestershire Unique Job Postings March 2020 to February 2023 Source: Lightcast

6. Business Closures and Incorporations

In February 2023 the number of businesses that ceased trading was 807. The figure for February 2019 was 1,351, 2020 554, 2021 102 and 2022 985.

In January 2022 there were 1,365 businesses that ceased trading. This is a monthly fall of 558 business failures.




Figure 14: LLEP Area Dissolved or Liquidated Businesses Monthly Comparator Source: BVD Fame

Figure 14 below compares the monthly numbers of dissolved or liquidated businesses for the years 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023.




Figure 15: LLEP Area Cumulative Growth in Dissolved or Liquidated Businesses 2019, 20, 21, 22 and 23. Source: BVD Fame




Figure 16: LLEP Area Cumulative Growth in Incorporated Businesses 2019, 20, 21, 22 and 23. Source: BVD Fame

In 2023 (to the end of February) there were 1,952 business incorporations. For the same period in 2019 the figure was 1,693, in 2020 1,888, 2021 1,651 and 2022 1,822.

In February 2023 the number of businesses that were incorporated was 1,062. The figure for February 2019 was 883, 2020 975, 2021 854 and 2022 838.




Figure 17: LLEP Area Incorporated Businesses Monthly Comparator Source: BVD Fame




Figure 18: LLEP Area Dissolved and Incorporated Businesses Monthly Comparator Source: BVD Fame

When comparing closures with incorporations in 2023 (YTD) there were 2,172 closures and 1,952 incorporations. This is a difference of 220.

Table 4 demonstrates those sectors where there have been 10 or more business failures and 10 or more incorporations for the year to date (2023). Table 4 also helps provide an understanding of the impact of the cost-of-living crisis on business and how different sectors are reacting. It shows how different parts of the local business community are expanding and contracting.
